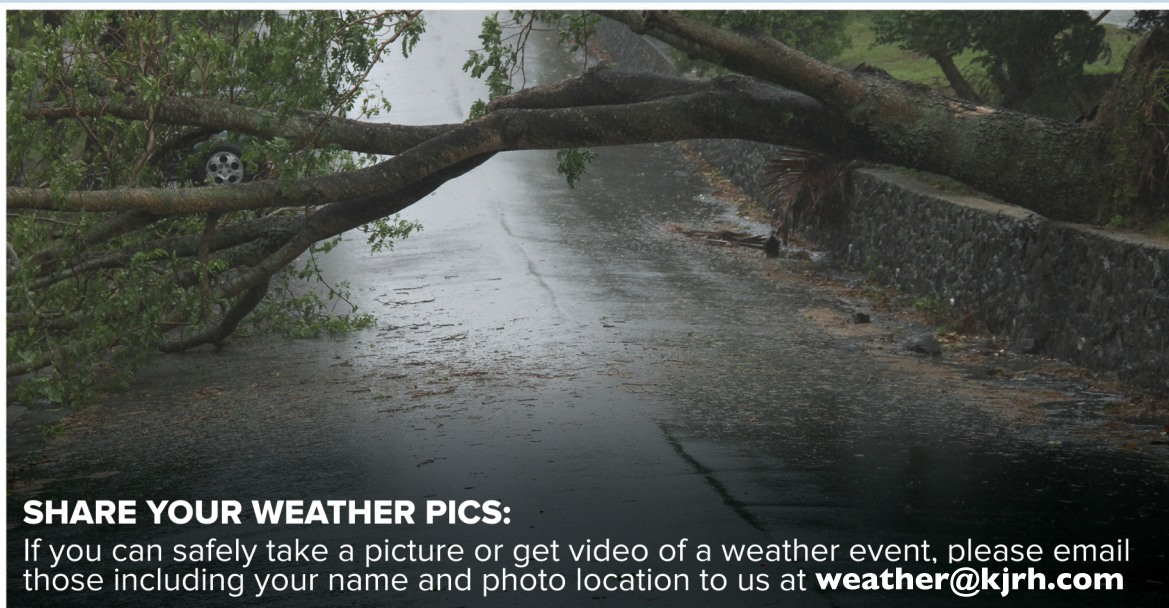

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SAFETY GUIDE



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WARNING AND WATCHES: WHAT'S THE DIFFERENCE?

WARNING – It **IS** happening! Seek shelter immediately.

- Tornado - Detected by National Weather Service radar or sighted by a trained storm spotter.
- Severe Thunderstorm - Winds detected of at least 58 mph and/or hail of one inch in diameter.

WATCH - It **MIGHT** happen – Prepare yourself and your family.

- Tornado - Conditions are favorable for the development of tornadoes.
- Severe Thunderstorm – Conditions are favorable for severe thunderstorms.

SEVERE WEATHER SAFETY PLAN:

Have a meeting with your family, staff or group to discuss your plan ahead of the storm.

Stay calm – Children and others look to their parents and leaders to know how to act.

Locate your safe place – A shelter or inner room that puts two sets of walls between you and outside. Put together your **severe weather survival kit** and store in your safe place.

Conduct a weather safety drill.

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2 WORKS FOR YOU SAFETY TIPS

TORNADO SAFETY

MOVE TO A PRE-DESIGNATED LOCATION:

- If an underground shelter is not available, move to an interior room on the lowest floor
- Stay away from windows
- In your car, do not try to outrun a tornado. Leave your car immediately. Lie flat in a ditch and cover your head. If in a mobile home, leave immediately for a more substantial structure
- If outdoors, lie flat in a nearby ditch or low lying area.
- Do not take shelter under an overpass.

SEVERE THUNDERSTORM AND LIGHTNING SAFETY

IF YOU CAN HEAR THUNDER, YOU ARE CLOSE ENOUGH BE STRUCK BY LIGHTNING.

- Go inside immediately!
- Get out of the lake/pool and off of the water.
- Get off the golf course and/or sports fields.
- Stay away from windows.
- Don't bathe or shower.


FLOOD SAFETY

TURN AROUND, DON'T DROWN.

- Do not walk or drive through flooded areas or roadways.
- Move to higher ground immediately.
- If you do drive into flood waters, leave your vehicle immediately and seek high ground. Rapidly rising water can easily sweep vehicles away.

IF YOU ARE CAUGHT OUTDOORS AND NO SHELTER IS NEARBY:

- Find a low spot away from trees, fences and poles that is not subject to flooding.
- Squat low to the ground on the balls of your feet.
- Place your hands on your knees with your head between them.
- Makes yourself the smallest target possible and minimize your contact with the ground.

DOES DRY WEATHER LEAD TO INFESTATION?




No, this is not necessarily true. Infestations occur just as much when we have a lot of rain. Pests invade equally during hot, cold, dry or rainy weather. Dry weather is a problem for many pests. Pests are similar to people in which they need water to survive. The water is necessary for them to reproduce and live so when the weather outside is too dry the pests need to find a way to survive. That means that whatever it takes to get some water and moisture they are willing to try it. The best place for them to get that is to get inside a home. If you were dying of thirst you would get water any way possible. The same goes for pests. Pest infestation problems occur when the weather is dry outside can be a serious problem. Make sure that you keep your pest control services going all year long!

PESTS & WET WEATHER



This is when there is some rainfall or moisture in the air but not a flood. The water is great for pests and is necessary for them to survive. Now when this is the current weather you need to be ready to deal with an influx of pests. The wetness is a great catalyst for pests to reproduce which is like a domino effect. Now that there are more pests they need to find food. That can lead to more and more pests getting in your home looking for food to eat and that can then lead to an infestation. Be extremely cautious when the weather has some rainfall.

INFESTATION WARNING SIGNS



Ants trailing is a good indicator that you have an ant infestation. It is impossible to detect termites outside of the home, so inspections are very important. Inside there will often be mud trails on walls if there is an active termite infestation. Frequently the only indicator of a termite infestation is when they swarm in the springtime, look for wings on window sills, etc. Also carpenter ants will leave saw dust on window sills and around doors.

ANTS & FLOODING



Water and moisture are necessary for pests to service but too much of anything is not always good. If you are in an area that is flooding from a serious change in the weather you need to be careful for one particular pest. Ants are a real problem when the weather gets so bad that there is flooding. The water can be too much for some pests to handle but ants will ride the wave. You may think that ants are not a problem and then as soon as there is a flood the ants will use the flow of water to get to a new location by making a kind of "floating ant raft". That means you can have an infestation of ants fairly quickly when you didn't have an issue before.

PEST PREVENTION



Remove winter debris from yard and around the house, replace old mulch in flower beds, never leave standing water, keep the lawn cut short, make sure trees and shrubs are at least a half an inch away from the home, this prevents pests from finding a way in, seal up your home by caulking windows and weather stripping doors.

Keep vital documents close at hand. If you have to evacuate, you'll want to take necessary and hard-to-replace documents.

Here's a list of what should be in a waterproof, lockable container you can easily grab.

- ☐ Checkbook, savings account passbook
- ☐ Safe deposit box key
- ☐ Birth, death and marriage certificates, divorce decree
- ☐ Will and power of attorney
- ☐ Social Security card and records
- ☐ Military records
- ☐ Medical records (living will, health care surrogacy, etc.)
- ☐ Insurance policies
- ☐ Health insurance cards
- ☐ Retirement account records
- ☐ Recent pay stubs, in case you have to document employment to collect benefits
- ☐ Tax returns
- ☐ Car titles and registrations
- ☐ Mortgage deeds or rental agreements
- ☐ Warranties and receipts
- ☐ Credit cards
- ☐ Passports, green cards
- ☐ Food stamps, WIC or other benefit cards and paperwork
- ☐ List of important phone numbers (relatives, bank and insurance company)
- ☐ Device on which you back up computer files just before you shut down the computer and evacuate
- ☐ Home inventory (on paper, device or video; you should keep another copy in a safe place)
- ☐ A few family photographs or other memorabilia
