OAG FIFCTION INTEGRITY TALKING POINTS

Election Integrity:

- Over the last several decades, Republicans, Democrats and Independents across the nation have expressed doubt about the integrity of our election systems, and even the results of some elections. The same is true in Virginia.
- Governor Youngkin, Attorney General Miyares, and Lt. Governor Earle-Sears pledged during the 2021 campaign to pursue policies that would strengthen election integrity and add transparency to our election process.
- Attorney General Miyares believes it should be easy to vote, and hard to cheat. In less than a year, AG Miyares has taken the following steps:
 - On Day One, the Office of Attorney General fired dozens of activist bureaucrats and hired highly qualified attorneys who are committed to upholding the Constitution. One of those hires was a trusted elections expert to lead the Office's efforts to uphold the law and hold election officials accountable (Josh Lief).
 - O The Office of Attorney General is conducting several investigations into election irregularities and election official misconduct across the state. We cannot share the details of these investigations, but the results will be public in due time.
 - O Attorney General Miyares has created an election integrity unit composed of attorneys and investigators that will work closely with law enforcement to ensure that this November's elections are conducted pursuant to the law and at the highest level of integrity.
 - O The Office of Attorney General has successfully defeated several election lawsuits, including the one by Paul Goldman, a liberal activist, that sought to discredit the results of the 2021 election.
- Governor Youngkin has taken the following steps:
 - Signed a bill to stop outside interference in elections, including prohibiting money, gifts and services to election offices from private individuals or nongovernmental organizations.
 - Signed a bill to increase transparency by providing absentee results by precinct so voters can see who is voting absentee in person and by mail and what precinct they're coming from.
 - O Signed a bill to make Virginia's voter rolls even cleaner by removing deceased voters every week (up from receiving report from Dept. of Vital Statistics once a month)
- While the Governor and Attorney General have accomplished a lot on this issue, there is still more reform needed, but that requires cooperation with the General Assembly and the Democrat-controlled Senate.
- For example, this year Republicans passed legislation to reinstate voter ID and end the use of unattended drop-boxes for ballots, only to see it die in the Senate.

2020 Ballot Retention Process:

- According to Virginia Code 24.2-669, ballots from old elections are discarded after 24 months.
 The ballots for the 2020 election are slated to be discarded this Fall.
- However, the Virginia Department of Elections maintains election results records of elections indefinitely.
- The Office of the Attorney General has reviewed the 2020 election results, along with hundreds of documents from concerned citizens and elected officials, and we have not seen any evidence of widespread fraud that would change the results of Virginia's 2020 election. Therefore, we have no justification to sue to stop the discarding of the ballots this year.
- Attorney General Miyares has pledged to call balls and strikes, and to work to promote free and fair elections conducted pursuant to law, but we cannot create law. Any change to the state law regarding ballot retention or other election practices must go through the General Assembly legislative process.

OPERATION CEASEFIRE

- Operation Ceasefire is a proven approach to address violent criminal activity among serious and repeat offenders, which showed extreme success in Richmond from 2004-2008.
- The vast majority of <u>violent crime</u> is committed by <u>repeat offenders</u>. Operation Ceasefire <u>leverages strategic and effective partnerships</u> throughout Virginia to <u>prosecute gun crime</u>, <u>invest in gang prevention</u>, <u>support community policing in high-crime</u> neighborhoods, and <u>getting repeat</u>, <u>violent offenders off our streets</u>.

STATISTICS

- In 2021, there were 16,823 violent criminal offenses (murder, non-negligent manslaughter, rape, sodomy, sexual assault with object, aggravated assault, and robbery) involving 19,461 victims, and firearms represented 45% of all known weapons used in aggravated assault. A firearm, particularly handgun, is the number one weapon or use of force involved in violent crime.
- Virginia's murder rate has nearly doubled in one decade!

TALKING POINTS

- Over the last several years, we have seen the heartbreaking news of more and more violent crime on our streets.
 - The impact of crime in our communities is real, and painful for the victims. - For several years, myself, supported by other legislators, worked to bring back a revised and revamped version of Operation Ceasefire to Virginia → you carried legislation on this in 2020.

Witness Protection

- One of the hardest things to do as a prosecutor is convince a victim to relive the
 worst moment of their life and testify in court. It takes an incredible amount of
 bravery. Frequently, victims worry that testifying will put them more at risk.
 Without victims willing to testify, prosecutors can't do their jobs and put these
 repeat offenders behind bars.
- The "defund the police" movement is another contributing factor to the rise in violent crime across our Commonwealth, and our nation.
 - o The high vacancy rates in some cities PD's is far too high.
 - The combination of the loss of law enforcement officers, with criminal first, victim last policies of the last two years have left our Commonwealth less safe and our communities crying out for help.
- We are excited about the partnership ahead to restore safety to our communities. But let this be a warning to any and all who seek to further wreak havoc and senselessly engage in violent activity stop or you will face the consequences.

FENTANYL/BORDER/IMMIGRATION

GENERAL

- Fentanyl is a synthetic opioid that is up to 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine.

The unit is not made up of 20 lawyers. As the press release states, it is made up of about 20 attorneys, paralegals, and investigators who already work at the AG's office. So while some members of the unit do have criminal experience, not all and it is incorrect to assume that all 20 individuals could do criminal appeals.

Virginia law gives the Attorney General original and broad jurisdiction over election law. The unit is new because we are bringing together and restructuring our resources, placing newfound focus on the matters in an effort to increase collaboration and cooperation between OAG, the State Board and Department of Elections, law enforcement and the election community. However, our powers and jurisdiction under the code of the Virginia haven't changed.

I'm writing because we believe your recent editorial on the Attorney General's election integrity unit needs some clarification.

The section below attempts to describe the staffing of the unit. However, you fail to mention that since our Office already has broad and original jurisdiction over election law, these attorneys were already practicing election law as employees of the OAG. That's why no additional funds are needed for the unit - the work is already being done. We've simple restructured attorneys who are already employees.

"Then there is a question of resource allocation. In February, Miyares pleaded with the General Assembly for additional staffing, saying that his office was unable to keep pace with the number of criminal appeals following the jurisdictional expansion of the Virginia Court of Appeals.

At the time, Miyares <u>said he needed another 75 staffers</u>. That it came after <u>the AG fired 30 staff</u>, including 17 lawyers, after taking office only to request money to hire staff surely raised lawmakers' eyebrows. But Miyares' office is now apparently so flush with resources that he can task 20 lawyers to a vanity project to tackle a non-existent problem. That is informative as lawmakers consider future staff and funding requests."

Equating criminal appeals and election law lawyers is also not accurate, as each requires a specific type of experience and knowledge - that's like saying a brain surgeon can perform open heart surgery. Mark Herring also requested the additional criminal appeals lawyers in light of the general assembly.

Attached here is a fact sheet about the unit.

- What will the Unit do?
 - Provide legal advice to the State Board and Department of Elections.
 - Investigate and prosecute violations of Virginia election law and take civil actions as appropriate to enforce election law.
 - Defend challenges to Virginia's election law and practices.
 - Work with the State Board and the Department of Elections, law enforcement and the election community to promote uniformity in elections and enforce the law as written.
 - Protect the rights of Virginians from voter intimidation, suppression or anything that wrongfully infringes on their right to vote.
 - Continue to review changes to voting practices, including to local precincts, boundaries, and polling places, to protect minority voters' right to vote.
- The unit is made up of around 20 existing attorneys, investigators, and paralegals within the office of the attorney general. However, the number of staff assigned to election matters varies depending on workload.
 - The attorneys and staff within the unit will work on elections issues as the need arises. These duties are in addition to work they are already doing at OAG
- No additional or new funds are required for this unit.
- The Attorney General has original and broad jurisdiction over election law.
 - The AG serves as legal counsel to the Board and Department of Elections.
 - Original jurisdiction to prosecute and/or bring suit with respect to any election law violations and to assure the enforcement of the election laws.
 - o The AG also has statutory authority to protect the rights of voters.
- The Attorney General <u>already had all of these powers</u>.
- The unit is simply a restructuring, placing a newfound focus on the matters to increase collaboration and cooperation between OAG, the State Board and Department of Elections, law enforcement and the election community.



Top-Line Message Points

Republicans made some significant promises on the campaign trail in 2021, including a pledge to get Virginia out of the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative — a cap-and-trade system driving up power bills for every Virginian. While Democrats in the General Assembly blocked our efforts to act legislatively. Governor Youngkin has begun the process through administrative policy, much to the consternation of Democrats.

Below, find background information and topline messaging points:

- Earlier this month, Governor Youngkin began the process of changing policy to remove Virginia from the Regional Greenhouse Gas Inititaive.
- RGGI, is a multi-state compact established by states in the northeast to cap their emissions of carbon dioxide from power plants.
- Each year RGGI sets a limit for how much carbon can be emitted by utilities in member states, and auctions off the rights to those emissions, offering fewer credits each year for sale.

- Virginia utilities must either have to retire coal-fired units and replace them with natural gas or other sources – or purchase credits on the open market.
- The State Corporation Commission found that the net cost for Dominion alone would be \$6 billion in terms of credits and "stranded assets" power plants that can't be used resulting in up to a 10% increase on the average electric bill, or \$144 per year.
- Worse, even after the disruption and expense, RGGI does not reduce carbon emissions.
- Democrats have cried foul, but once again they've been caught out by their own bad legislation.
- When Democrats passed the law authorizing participation in RGGI, they made it permissive, not mandatory.
- Said simply, the law says the Commonwealth is "is authorized" to participate, but it is not required to do so.
- "Authorized" is not the same as "shall," no matter how much Democrats protest to the contrary.
- As President Obama liked to say, elections have consequences.

Here are some talking points to help our CLO's be knowledgeable about election integrity complaints.

OAG ELECTION INTEGRITY TALKING POINTS

Election Integrity:

- Over the last several decades, Republicans, Democrats and Independents across the nation have expressed doubt about the integrity of our election systems, and even the results of some elections. The same is true in Virginia.
- Governor Youngkin, Attorney General Miyares, and Lt. Governor Earle-Sears pledged during the 2021 campaign to pursue policies that would strengthen election integrity and add transparency to our election process.
- Attorney General Miyares believes it should be easy to vote, and hard to cheat. In less than a
 year, AG Miyares has taken the following steps:
 - On Day One, the Office of Attorney General fired dozens of activist bureaucrats and hired highly qualified attorneys who are committed to upholding the Constitution. One of those hires was a trusted elections expert to lead the Office's efforts to uphold the law and hold election officials accountable (Josh Lief).
 - O The Office of Attorney General is conducting several investigations into election irregularities and election official misconduct across the state. We cannot share the details of these investigations, but the results will be public in due time.
 - Attorney General Miyares has created an election integrity unit composed of attorneys and investigators that will work closely with law enforcement to ensure that this November's elections are conducted pursuant to the law and at the highest level of integrity.
 - O The Office of Attorney General has successfully defeated several election lawsuits, including the one by Paul Goldman, a liberal activist, that sought to discredit the results of the 2021 election.
- Governor Youngkin has taken the following steps:
 - Signed a bill to stop outside interference in elections, including prohibiting money, gifts and services to election offices from private individuals or nongovernmental organizations.
 - Signed a bill to increase transparency by providing absentee results by precinct so voters can see who is voting absentee in person and by mail and what precinct they're coming from.
 - Signed a bill to make Virginia's voter rolls even cleaner by removing deceased voters every week (up from receiving report from Dept. of Vital Statistics once a month)
- While the Governor and Attorney General have accomplished a lot on this issue, there is still more reform needed, but that requires cooperation with the General Assembly and the Democrat-controlled Senate.
- For example, this year Republicans passed legislation to reinstate voter ID and end the use of unattended drop-boxes for ballots, only to see it die in the Senate.

2020 Ballot Retention Process:

- According to Virginia Code 24.2-669, ballots from old elections are discarded after 24 months.
 The ballots for the 2020 election are slated to be discarded this Fall.
- However, the Virginia Department of Elections maintains election results records of elections indefinitely.
- The Office of the Attorney General has reviewed the 2020 election results, along with hundreds of documents from concerned citizens and elected officials, and we have not seen any evidence of widespread fraud that would change the results of Virginia's 2020 election. Therefore, we have no justification to sue to stop the discarding of the ballots this year.
- Attorney General Miyares has pledged to call balls and strikes, and to work to promote free and fair elections conducted pursuant to law, but we cannot create law. Any change to the state law regarding ballot retention or other election practices must go through the General Assembly legislative process.

Members of the State Board of Elections have been blind copied.

I am not sure if you are aware, but earlier today Sen. Chase offered a <u>floor amendment</u> to the budget to provide \$3 million to "conduct election integrity investigations" that would allot 22 full time positions to the Office of the Attorney

General (OAG). Thankfully, it was ultimately defeated in a voice vote. This is coming the day after a meeting was held with her and the OAG in which she touted that she provided <u>"evidence" that was "very well received"</u> by the Attorney General and not more than two weeks after news of an election denier hired to be Deputy Attorney General to oversee elections <u>resigned</u> only after her social media posts touting election conspiracies and January 6 insurrectionists as "patriots" became public. These issues raise numerous concerns for me and my staff and the broader elections community in Virginia.

As you know, the Department is dedicated to working to address actual issues and answer legitimate questions about Virginia's elections process. Department staff and local election officials work hard every day to ensure that Virginia's elections are safe, secure, fair, and free. We are happy to work hand in hand with the OAG in these efforts, but we need assurances directly from the Attorney General that he supports the work of the Department of Elections and our local election officials and that he rejects these conspiracy theories vocalized by the Senator and others like the former Deputy Attorney General.

At this point, I believe it is incumbent upon General Miyares to make a public statement or, at the very least, provide a statement to my staff, the general registrars, and the Electoral Board members that he is behind us and committed to promoting the good work these dedicated public servants have done to administer safe and secure elections that the public can trust. Anything less would legitimize concerns that the Attorney General will not faithfully defend the good work of these dedicated public servants.



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TAZEWELL, Va. — Voters in Bluefield, Va., learning that their new polling place is the Richlands Police Department and a Cedar Bluff woman being told that her new polling place is in Russell County are two examples of the errors being found among notices that

were mailed out in Southwest Virginia.

The Virginia Department of Elections has identified that there is an issue with voter notices sent to some voters in Southwest Virginia, according to a statement issued by the department. Voters with a P.O. Box may have received a voter notice with incorrect voting locations.

Localities affected by the notices include Tazewell and Buchanan Counties as well as Bristol City and the counties of Dickenson, Lee, Russell, Scott, Washington and Wise, according to the state Department of Elections.

Tazewell County Registrar Brian Earls said Tuesday that the state had hired a third-party vendor to mail out voting notices.

"It all stemmed back originally to this being a redistricting year, and all of our House and Senate district numbers changed and everybody had to get a new voter card," Earls said. "Everyone was issued a new voter notice so the state took on the expense and took it on to mail them out themselves, and so we had the first wave that went out and they sent it to everyone's physical address even if you had a P.O. Box. That was the first issue."

The new voter notices were sent out later were sent to P.O. Boxes to make up for the mistakes that were in the first wave of mailings, Earls said.

"So then this batch that was sent out to P.O. Boxes had the wrong information," he said. "It was way off. The only thing that was correct was the name and address on the front (of the envelope), but on the inside it had a different name and a voting location that may or may not have been within this county."

Earls said his office had appreciated the state hiring a third-party vendor.

"It would be a tough call right now to mail out for Tazewell County 28,000 plus cards. We thought it was going to be a good thing because we didn't have to do it ourselves," he said.

The state Commissioner of Elections sent out a statement Monday about the situation. Earls said that he has posted it on his office's Facebook page, but his office has been receiving "nonstop call from angry people."

"Some people in Bluefield (Va.) said they were assigned to vote at the police department in Richlands. A couple in Cedar Bluff said the husband had been changed to Richlands and the wife was changed to Russell County," he recalled.

The Department of Elections will mail corrected notices to all affected voters. Citizens can check their voting information on the department's website at www.elections.virginia.gov or by calling 804-864-8901 and dial 0 for the operator.

"It was just an unfortunate situation all around," Earls said. "They will be getting corrected notices. Feel free to dispose of those (old notices) because they were incorrect."

- What will the Unit do?
 - Provide legal advice to the State Board and Department of Elections.
 - Investigate and prosecute violations of Virginia election law and take civil actions as appropriate to enforce election law.

INCORRECT VOTER NOTICES SENT TO TOWN VOTERS IN FAIRFAX AND PRINCE WILLIAM COUNTIES

RICHMOND, VA - Voter notices sent to town voters in seven towns in Fairfax and Prince William counties included incorrect voting location information for Election Day.

The error was due to a printing issue in which the voting location was kept static on the print job and not changed for each voter. The number of affected voters in each town includes:

Dumfries: 3029 Haymarket: 1079 Occoquan: 878 Quantico: 367 Clifton: 199 Herndon: 13,387 Vienna: 12,169

The General Registrars of Fairfax County and Prince William County are sending corrected notices to these voters immediately. The Department of Elections will reimburse these localities for their expenses.

These notices will not affect any voter's ability to vote early because the notices only contained incorrect voting information for Election Day polling places. All affected voters will be mailed their correct voting information on Monday, October 24.

Attorney General Miyares Announces New Election Integrity Unit

RICHMOND, VA - Attorney General Jason Miyares (me-YAR-ez) today announced the creation of the Election Integrity Unit at the Office of the Attorney General. This unit will provide legal advice to the Department of Elections, investigate and prosecute violations of Virginia election law, work with the election community throughout the year to ensure uniformity and legality in application of election laws, and work with law enforcement to ensure legality and purity in elections.

The purpose of the unit is to provide advice, support, and resources to ensure that Virginia election law continues to be applied in a uniform manner, and increase confidence in our state elections.

"I pledged during the 2021 campaign to work to increase transparency and strengthen confidence in our state elections. It should be easy to vote, and hard to cheat. The Election Integrity Unit will work to help to restore confidence in our democratic process in the Commonwealth," said Attorney General Miyares.

Virginia has a system of elections that divides authority among 133 local electoral boards and general registrars and the bi-partisan State Board of Elections. The new Election Integrity Unit will work with the State Board, the Department of Elections and the dedicated, hard-working local election officials in the upcoming election and beyond. The unit is made up of more than 20 attorneys, investigators and paralegals from across the various divisions in Office of the Attorney General.

Under Virginia law, the Attorney General has broad original jurisdiction in the area of elections. Specifically, the law states that the Attorney General "shall have full authority to do whatever is necessary or appropriate to enforce the election laws or prosecute violations thereof. The Attorney General shall exercise the authority granted by this section to conduct an investigation, prosecute a violation [and] assure the enforcement of the elections laws . . .]."



According to Virginia law, the Attorney General has jurisdiction over all election law matters, serves as legal counsel to the Board and Department of Elections, and has original jurisdiction to prosecute and/or bring suit with respect to any election law violations. Therefore, the Office of the Attorney General already has attorneys within a section dedicated to election law matters. - The Attorney General <u>already has</u> original and broad jurisdiction over election law matters under Virginia law. Therefore, the unit's responsibilities are
 - Provide legal advice to the State Board and Department of Elections.
 - Investigate and prosecute violations of Virginia election law and take civil actions as appropriate to enforce election law.
 - Defend challenges to Virginia's election law and practices.
 - Work with the State Board and the Department of Elections, law enforcement and the election community to promote uniformity in elections and enforce the law as written.
 - Protect the rights of Virginians from voter intimidation, suppression or anything that wrongfully infringes on their right to vote.
 - Continue to review changes to voting practices, including to local precincts, boundaries, and polling places, to protect minority voters' right to vote.

The unit is a restructuring of these attorneys, placing a newfound focus on the matters in effort to increase collaboration and cooperation between our office, prosecutors, law enforcement and the election community.

Because all of the individuals in the unit are already employees of the Office of the Attorney General, no additional budget or new dollar is needed for the unit to operate.

Some of the staffers in the unit will work full time on election matters. However, the majority will not be full time, and while they already devote significant time to election issues, they have other responsibilities in their roles at the OAG.

Ensuring uniform compliance with state election law and increasing voter confidence are laudable goals. I'd urge you though to recommend new laws or executive orders to the governor to make elections even more secure. A few ideas.

- Pass a law that says election results must be kept for two years unless extended by a judge. Any office (local, state, fed) shall be overturned any time, even after the results are certified, if fraud is found that COULD HAVE made a difference in the outcome. Or, if fraud was found only in specific districts/precincts, the votes from those locations shall be subtracted from the vote totals by candidate, and whoever has the highest total votes after that process is sworn in.

Attorney General Miyares,

I applaud your efforts in forming the Election Integrity Unit for the Commonwealth of Virginia. However, election integrity in Virginia Beach has been missing for quite sometime and Virginia Beach would be a good place to examine.

And it appears, with all due respect, you have unwittingly endorsed a candidate for the Virginia Beach City Council who is ineligible to run for office. According to Virginia's Constitution (see attached), Article VII. Local Government, Section 6. Multiple offices, and the section referenced in Code of Virginia;

§ 15.2-1535. Members of governing body not to be elected or appointed by governing body to certain offices.

A. Pursuant to Article VII, Section 6 of the Constitution of Virginia, no member of a governing body of a locality shall be eligible, during the term of office for which he was elected or appointed, to hold any office filled by the governing body by election or appointment, except that a member of a governing body may be named a member of such other boards, commissions, and bodies as may be permitted by general law and except

that a member of a governing body may be named to fill a vacancy in the office of mayor or board chairman if permitted by general or special law.

This is very specific as any person elected or appointed may not run for office. The general law referenced above allows a candidate to run for reelection for the office for which they were elected. Note that a candidate that runs for another position, such as mayor, must resign their position to seek that office 30 days before filing with the voter registrar, which has been done in the past.

There are currently other appointed candidates running for council, and there are three currently sitting on the Virginia Beach City Council that have been appointed that are not eligible to run for election. Note that I did not say re-election. Two more council members that were appointed have illegally run for office and those elections should have been voided. In the current race, if these candidates continue to run for office and are elected, the Constitution also calls for this election to be voided. The taxpayers should not be forced to pay for another special election. Please see the legal precedent issued by former Attorney General Cuccinelli in April of 2013 (attached).

These codes were clearly written to prevent current appointees to have an unfair advantage of being an incumbent. The violation of the Constitution and the Code of Virginia threatens the very basis of election integrity.

I urge you to immediately issue a legal opinion that removes these candidates from the ballot. Just as candidates are excluded from running for office if they do not reside in the geographic area where they want to run, they should also be immediately disqualified, BY THE VOTER REGISTRAR, if they have been appointed to a governing body by the city council.

It is time to restore faith in our democracy and in our elections

An email of yours was shared with me wherein you stated the following on August 24th, "The Office of Attorney General is conducting several investigations into election irregularities and election official misconduct. We cannot share the details of these investigations, but the results will be public in due time. Attorney General Miyares has created an election integrity unit composed of attorneys and investigators that will work closely with law enforcement to ensure that future elections are conducted pursuant to law and at the highest level of integrity."

Opinion Jason Miyares: Why I created an Election Integrity Unit in Virginia

Jason Miyares, a Republican, is the Virginia attorney general.

As a first-generation American and child of a parent who escaped an oppressive regime, I have a deep appreciation for our innate rights and liberties. That appreciation might not be understood by individuals whose families have never experienced anything other than the liberties America offers.

When I was growing up, my mother told me stories about her childhood and early life in communist Cuba. She told me the horror of the secret police coming to their house and kidnapping my uncle in the middle of the night. She told me the pain of seeing Havana's thriving metropolis before Fidel Castro and communism turned her world upside down. She shared how painful it was to live in a country where the vulnerable have no voice, where there was no consent of the governed — the opposite of the American republic we all call home.

Gratitude is one of life's most underrated of human traits. I'm so grateful for the life, freedom and opportunities we have here as compared with so many areas of the world where people don't have a voice.

The most sacred of these freedoms is the right to vote. The ability to participate in a democracy through choosing our elected officials is an incredible right that is a cornerstone of our American miracle. One of my strongest beliefs is the simple concept that it should be easy to vote but hard to cheat.

Every Virginian, regardless of political affiliation, should have full faith and confidence in our election system. There is no reason any Virginian should have any doubt walking into a voting booth or mailing in a ballot. Wanting every Virginian to freely vote and to have absolute confidence in our democracy should not be controversial.

That's why I created an Election Integrity Unit within the Virginia Office of the Attorney General. As the son of an immigrant who fled an oppressive country, I want every Virginian to be confident in our American experiment.

The media has enjoyed making a panic over the unit's existence, claiming that I'm somehow aiming to discourage voting or spreading disinformation about our elections.

Let's be clear: Joe Biden won the 2020 presidential election, and there was no widespread voter fraud in Virginia or elsewhere in the country.

But that has nothing to do with my Election Integrity Unit.

For decades, the Office of the Attorney General has had broad and original jurisdiction over election law. The power of my office to prosecute any violation of Virginia election law, bring and defend civil actions involving elections and give legal advice to the Department of Elections well pre-dates my time as attorney general. For years, the Office of the Attorney General has had a dedicated group of election law lawyers who work every day to protect the sanctity of our election system.

The Election Integrity Unit is simply a restructuring of lawyers, paralegals and investigators already employed by my office and working on election matters. The goal is to more efficiently work with the election community by creating a more cooperative and collaborative approach from our office. This unit will also work to protect voting rights and crack down on voter intimidation.

No new tax dollars are used, and no individual is taken away from other responsibilities.

My Election Integrity Unit is designed to make my office work better for Virginians. That shouldn't be controversial. It should be expected. Government should work for its people.

It's a shame others doubt and villainize my intentions because of our party affiliations. I pray our country and our commonwealth outgrow this season of hyper-partisanship that makes even common-sense policies somehow controversial.

Virginians can understand what happened and ensure that it never happens again," McKay's letter said...Last month, Miyares unveiled the creation of an Election Integrity Unit, which aims to "administer legal advice to the Department of Elections, investigate and prosecute infractions of Virginia election law, work with the election community during the whole year to establish regularity and legality in the operation of election laws and work with law enforcement to secure legality and purity in elections."

DC News Now: After tough year, Alexandria schools discuss safety efforts

On Wednesday night, Alexandria City Public Schools held a safety forum to inform families of how it, along with city and police leaders, are efforting safety improvements in schools. The forum came at a critical time, as a recent survey found students, staff, and parents all felt they (or their children) were safer in Alexandria schools last year, as opposed to this year. A survey initiated by ACPS of nearly 7,000 students, parents, and teachers highlighted an alarming trend. A lower percentage of each of those groups felt safer in school this year, as opposed to last. In last year's survey, 75% of students said they either strongly agreed or agreed with the statement that they feel safe in schools. This year, just 57% responded that way...Between January and June of 2022, 26 ACPS students were arrested — 16 for fights/assaults. That doesn't include a brawl and fatal stabbing that happened at the Bradlee Shopping Center in May, an incident that prompted a return to virtual learning and raised concerns over mental health and physical safety...Community members also heard from a school resource officer, even as the roles of SROs are being weighed by a committee that could recommend their removal. "Kids come over and hug me," said Richard Sandoval. "Just know that we're committed to your children and look forward to a continued relationship." DC News Now has previously reported on back-and-forth letters between the city and school leadership in Alexandria and Republican Attorney General Jason Miyares, who has criticized the district for considering removing SROs.

Descano says he supports no-cash bail for non-violent offenders, even though those arrested will always face the possibility of a cash bail in front of a magistrate before his office gets involved."

Reporter: "What do you say to people who have to say, 'listen, if we don't put these non-violent offenders behind bars and punish them to the fullest degree of the law, give them a bond, keep them locked up, then it's kinda a get-out-of-jail-free card and some of those escalate to violent offenders down the line?'"

Descano: "Well, I would say that, um, first of all, the data that we're showing is only bond data. So, whether or not somebody is held or released is completely different from whether or not they are convicted. Second of all, what we see is when people are held pretail unnecessarily, it actually creates more crime."

Reporter: "The new database isn't a first for the commonwealth attorney's office. Steve Descano had the idea when he was campaigning for the office two years ago."

Homeowners in Buchanan County who suffered property losses in a July flash flood that decimated areas around Whitewood will not be eligible to receive aid from the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Gov. Glenn Youngkin said Wednesday. The news was a disappointment but not a surprise to many in Southwest Virginia; just a year ago, FEMA made the same ruling after a similar flood hit the Buchanan County community of Hurley. In that case, the state appealed the decision and the federal agency denied the request a second time, saying that the damage wasn't significant enough to warrant aid.

Washington Post: Inspector general probes \$268K state contract with Youngkin's ad-maker The state's inspector general is investigating how Gov. Glenn Youngkin's political ad-maker landed a \$268,000 state contract to make a tourism video featuring the Republican. Poolhouse, a Richmond-based Republican media firm that made \$1.5 million in campaign ads for Youngkin last year, was the only vendor to bid on the contract with the Virginia Tourism Corporation (VTC), a taxpayer-funded public authority.

Richmond Times-Dispatch: Chief's resignation brings calls for changes in Richmond police focus

Nobody's saying much about why police Chief Gerald Smith is leaving, but around City Hall, many indicate it's time for change at the top of Richmond Police Department. While the city administration hasn't released his resignation letter, or had an immediate response to repeated questions about whether Smith was asked to leave, Mayor Levar Stoney said the chief's departure is a chance for the city's law enforcement efforts to pivot.

Washington Post: <u>Va. prosecutor often sought violent suspects' detention and didn't get it, data shows</u>

Fairfax County's top prosecutor, who has faced criticism for practices some view as too lenient, released data Wednesday showing that his office recommended people accused of violent crimes be denied bail at 76 percent of hearings but that judges did so only about half the time. Commonwealth's Attorney Steve Descano (D) said Wednesday that his office released the bond data dashboard to increase transparency and identify disparities in local criminal justice. "You can't fix what you don't measure," Descano said Wednesday.

Richmond Times-Dispatch: <u>Special prosecutor ends investigation of former Colonial Heights police chief with no charges</u>

A special prosecutor will not pursue charges against former Colonial Heights police Chief Jeffrey Faries after conducting an investigation into allegations that Faries engaged in inappropriate behavior with underage girls he coached on the city high school's softball team. Lynchburg Commonwealth's Attorney Bethany Harrison, who was appointed in May to determine whether charges were warranted following a state police investigation, said she determined there was insufficient evidence to bring charges at this time.

The man who is accused of murdering Big Stone Gap Police Officer Michael Chandler was part of a widespread drug trafficking organization in Southwest Virginia, U.S. Attorney Christopher Kavanaugh announced Tuesday. Michael Donivan White is accused of killing Officer Chandler in November 2021. Following his arrest, Kavanaugh said that authorities discovered White was part of a widespread drug organization in Southwest Virginia. White is one of 19 people facing federal charges in connection with the organization..."Today's arrests broke up a large-scale drug operation that brought huge quantities of lethal narcotics and, subsequently, violence and tragedy, into Southwest Virginia," Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares said. "The murder of Officer Chandler shook all of Virginia and is a painful reminder of the risk law enforcement willingly embrace every day. As my office supports the prosecution in that case, we are proud of all our partners, particularly the U.S. Attorney's office and the lead law enforcement agencies, the Virginia State Police and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, and their unwavering commitment to justice" ... court documents stated the 19 defendants participated in a conspiracy to distribute more than 100 pounds of methamphetamine, as well as heroin and fentanyl.

WSET: 'We support you:' AG Miyares talks crime solutions with officers at luncheon Tuesday The Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares stopped by the Hill City Tuesday to speak to officers from across the Commonwealth. The AG spoke at Liberty University's School of Law building, thanking officers at the Law Enforcement Appreciation Luncheon. Miyares said a big goal of his to keep communities safe, is to have a constant open dialogue with officers. This luncheon was an opportunity for Miyares to listen to officers' needs moving forward. He spoke at length thanking the officers for what they do every day and the sacrifices they make for the public's safety. Altavista Chief of Police Tommy Merricks was one of the dozens of police departments invited to today's luncheon. He said the support isn't something he's used to seeing. "It's very refreshing to have an Attorney General that wants to work with law enforcement," Merricks said. He said that support is something that Miyares' office has always put a focus on. "Since day one, he has had one of his staff members reaching out to all of the law enforcement agencies around," Merricks said. Attorney General Miyares said that support and communication with each department are key to fixing the crime problem in the state. "Today is a day for me to show appreciation," Miyares said. "But it's also to listen and talk with law enforcement about what they're seeing on the streets." According to Virginia's official crime report figures from 2021, violent crime is on the rise. There were almost 16,823 violent crimes reported in 2021, compared to 15,713 in 2020 -- a 7% increase. That includes a 6% increase in homicides, from 528 to 562. Miyares said policy changes are a key first step to fixing the problem.

"Nothing frustrates an officer more than seeing a catch-and-release program," Miyares said. "When they see people getting revolving door -- getting back on the street. We want to give law enforcement the tools they need to do their jobs." Miyares said his office is focusing on prosecuting violent offenders to the fullest extent of the law, especially repeat offenders. "It also means having the prosecutors in place to prosecute repeat violent offenders as well," Miyares said. "I think that's a critical component. We work closely with law enforcement. We've gone around every corner of the state meeting in law enforcement roundtables." He said with fewer criminals on the street, communities will be safer.

Merricks said he's confident if they keep working together, crime will come down. "If they can keep the lines of communication open like they've done a great job with, I think we'll move forward," Merricks said. The AG finished his speech by thanking the officers for their bravery in keeping our communities safe every day. He said that they're hiring new prosecutors as a part of their new Cease Fire initiative to help ensure that violent criminals stay off the streets.

WJHL: <u>Man accused of killing Big Stone Gap officer among 19 charged in conspiracy that 'flooded' Southwest Virginia with drugs</u>

U.S. Attorney Christopher Kavanaugh, Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares and representatives from the ATF and local law enforcement agencies spoke outside of the U.S. District Courthouse in Abingdon...According to Kavanaugh, the group of offenders "flooded Southwest Virginia" with more than 100 pounds of methamphetamine, as well as other drugs like heroin and fentanyl. Over the last year, Kavanaugh said a team made up of local, state and federal investigators built a case...The investigation is still ongoing as of Tuesday, and Kavanaugh believes more charges could be brought against other people and the 19 already arrested. Miyares said the investigation broke up a large-scale drug operation, which was bringing "large quantities" of lethal narcotics and ultimately violent crime to Southwest Virginia. "The murder of Officer Chandler shook all of Virginia," Miyares said. "And is a painful reminder of the risks our law enforcement heroes take every day." According to Miyares, the murder charges against White are moving forward in court. He also thanked the participating law enforcement agencies, including those from East Tennessee that contributed to the investigation.

WDBJ: Attorney General Jason Miyares plans to curb violent crime in Virginia

Attorney General Jason Miyares spoke at Liberty University's 2nd annual law enforcement appreciation lunch. He aims to reduce violence, lower gang activity, and protect those who are willing to testify against violent repeat-offenders. Miyares states "Operation ceasefire is, we viewed kind of the three-step process. This is coming from our office in connection with the governor's office. One of it is intervention, we are going to push for different intervention programs for young people, so they know not to join gang activity. It's also prosecution, if you are a repeat violent offender using a gun to commission a felony, we are going to be prosecuting you to the fullest extent of the law. The last is protection, and this has set up a victim witness protection fund. Whether its traveling or lodging so that they can feel comfortable coming forward." Lynchburg is one of 13 cities listed under Operation Ceasefire. Miyares says it's because of increased crime and drugs. He states "Unfortunately, you are seeing an influx of both meth and fentanyl. A lot of it is crossing our southern border. We are seeing it come to our communities and what is so tragic, what I am seeing all over the commonwealth are people who think they are taking something else. It could be so much as a Percocet they get a party that they pass away from. Everybody has to be careful, one pill can kill" We reached out to the Lynchburg Police Department on how Operation Ceasefire will impact their jobs, and they told us they plan to meet with the Attorney General's office about how to implement the program in the future.

News & Advance: Miyares speaks at Liberty University event honoring law enforcement Attorney General Jason Miyares was a special guest Tuesday afternoon at Liberty University's second annual Law Enforcement Appreciation Lunch. "For the men and women that wear the uniform, we have such incredible appreciation for the work you do. I go to work in the morning and put on a tie, you go to work in the morning and put on a bulletproof vest," Miyares said to the audience gathered. "It's unlike any job in America today. I call it the hardest job." Law enforcement members from Lynchburg and surrounding areas, including Altavista, Bedford, South Boston and Martinsville, attended the event.

In early September, Miyares' office announced the Election Integrity Unit, a team of existing attorneys, investigators and paralegals from across various divisions in the attorney general's office that will provide legal advice to the state Department of Elections as well as investigate and prosecute violations of Virginia election law. The announcement came after reports of law enforcement investigations into alleged misconduct in the Nottoway County election office and disputes between an electoral board member and registrar, according to the Richmond Times-Dispatch. At Tuesday's event, Miyares, a Republican, told The News & Advance he believes ensuring a fair election is a bipartisan issue and he thinks, broadly, most Virginians agree. "What I want is everybody to know what the law is, have confidence in our election system, so we can have free, fair elections," Miyares said. Some Republicans around the country have used election integrity as a rallying cry after President Donald Trump lost to Joe Biden in 2020 and false claims of widespread election fraud spread. Miyares' announcement last month about the Election Integrity Unity's creation was met with some criticism that those resources could be better allocated elsewhere. In an op-ed published last week in The Washington Post, Miyares noted "there was no widespread voter fraud in Virginia or elsewhere in the country" in the 2020 election but said the Election Integrity Unit had nothing to do with that — rather, it's intended to help his office more efficiently work on election matters and protect voting rights.

Miyares on Tuesday also discussed Operation Ceasefire, as Lynchburg is an area selected by the attorney general's office for the effort, which is intended to be a comprehensive strategy to combat violent crime. The attorney general told reporters he and his office looked at the different cities that were impacted by violent crime around the commonwealth. Miyares said Operation Ceasefire is as a three-step process: intervention programs for youths so they know not to join gang activity; prosecution for repeat violent offenders; and protection for witnesses of violent crimes, so they can feel comfortable coming forward. Miyares told reporters, "What we have found is the best way to lower violence is to go after these repeat violent offenders and prosecute them and get them off our streets."

Miyares said there has been an influx of methamphetamine and fentanyl in the commonwealth as well. He said he believes a person selling someone fentanyl knowingly is committing murder, comparing it to giving someone rat poison. "What I'm seeing all over the commonwealth are people that think they are taking something else," Miyares said. Martinsville Police Chief Eddie Cassady said the opioid pandemic hit his city "really hard." "There were a few years ago that we were number one in the state for opioid cases," Cassady told The News and Advance. Altavista Police Chief Tommy Merricks praised having an attorney general who wants to work with the police. "We have not always had that in Virginia. It's good that he is about law and order, and he's about reaching out and helping and working with local departments to make sure all of the citizens are safe," Merricks said.

Lynchburg Police Chief Ryan Zuidema said it was great to be invited to the event and said it's always a good time when "brave men and women of our departments can be recognized for the great work they do in the community." Zuidema mentioned the last few years have been challenging. "We've seen both the worst of society and at the same time, the best of society," Zuidema said. "So it's been challenging on the one front and it required us to really assess a lot of what we did and how we did it."

VPM: <u>AG's office wanted to limit in-person comments on Youngkin's proposed transgender policies</u>

Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares' office pushed the State Board of Education to ban in-person public comments related to proposed policies concerning the treatment of transgender students. In an Oct. 18 email obtained by VPM News, Senior Assistant Attorney General Deborah Love told Daniel Gecker, chair of the board of education, that the board had no authority over the policies. Allowing the public to comment on them in that venue, Love wrote in the email, would violate the board's bylaws and result in comments that could not formally be considered by the body actually in charge of the policies: the Virginia Department of Education. "There is significant potential for confusion should the Board receive comments from the public on the proposed Model Policies," Love wrote. She urged Gecker to refer people who wanted to comment on the policies to the official channel, a state website called Town Hall.

Gecker, who was first appointed to the board by former Gov. Terry McAuliffe, rejected what he described in an email as "unsolicited advice" that would have "limited our accessibility to the public and would be bad policy." At the Oct. 20 meeting, Gecker reiterated that the board had no authority over the proposed policies and that the comments would not be considered as part of the policies' review. But he allowed the commenters to proceed. For more than three hours, parents, activists and students lined up to give their thoughts. The majority spoke out against the policies...Youngkin has championed the proposal as part of a push for "parent's rights" in education, though many of the comments the board received in person and online have come from self-described parents who oppose the policies. Youngkin's spokesperson did not respond to requests for comment on the AG office's email. Miyares' spokesperson, Victoria LaCivita, encouraged people to submit feedback online, where it would be recorded into the public record. "The Attorney General believes transparency is crucial in government, and that it is his responsibility to call balls and strikes." LaCivita said. "The Attorney General wants to ensure that not only is every Virginian heard, but that they are heard by the correct entity." Gecker said the board "routinely hears public comment on any matter related to public education and said it "places great importance on hearing from parents, students. educators and other members of the public."

The attorney general office's legal argument hinges on a line in the board's bylaws stating that the public "may address the Board during the public comment portion of the meeting on any matter related to public education which includes the action of the Board." "Which includes actions of the Board' modifies the scope of permitted public comment to matters falling within the Board's jurisdiction (which the Model Policies do not)," Love wrote. She cc'd Jillian Balow, the superintendent of public instruction, asking her to share the advice with other members of the board. Eden Heilman, legal director at the ACLU of Virginia, said Love's interpretation was incorrect, pointing to a state law that says "includes' means includes, but not limited to." "Certainly, something that affects this many people — that has garnered 60,000-plus comments, that's resulted in thousands of students walking out of their classrooms across the state — the board has every right to hear testimony on this issue," Heilman said in an interview.

The deadline for submitting comments online regarding the proposed policies is 11:59 p.m. Wednesday. State officials must then respond to any claims the policies might violate existing law — and post those responses for at least 30 days. In an interview Monday, Balow said her team would spend time "really parsing out what the key themes are" in the comments before considering possible edits to the draft policies. She declined to discuss the effort of Miyares' office to limit comment during board meetings. The proposed policies don't carry any weight on their own. Instead, they must be

passed or modified by local school boards. Leaders in some localities, including Richmond, Fairfax County and Alexandria, have already said they won't implement them.

Required immunizations for school and childcare attendance statewide are determined by the General Assembly and the Virginia Department of Health." The legal opinion was requested by Gov. Glenn Youngkin.

According to court documents, Maria Kokolis, 48, of Williamsburg, owned and operated Pamisage, Inc., a center for integrative behavioral health and medicine, with a focus on weight management issues. Beginning in or about 2018, and continuing through February 2020, Kokolis executed a scheme to defraud and overbill various health care benefit programs and the Virginia Medical Assistance Program (Medicaid) ... Kokolis used the names, Medicaid ID numbers, and other identifying information of her clients in submitting these false claims to the health care benefit programs. Kokolis received a total of at least \$2,202,627.77 in fraudulent health care benefit program reimbursements, a portion of which came from the U.S. government...Jessica D. Aber, U.S. Attorney for the Eastern District of Virginia; Brian Dugan, Special Agent in Charge of the FBI's Norfolk Field Office; and Jason S. Miyares, Attorney General of Virginia, made the announcement after sentencing by U.S. District Judge Arenda L. Wright-Allen.

WRIC: Opioid epidemic cost Virginia \$3.5 billion in 2020, VDH opioid cost calculator shows
The Virginia Department of Health has developed an online calculator to show how much the opioid epidemic has impacted Virginians in lost labor, healthcare, crime and other costs. According to the calculator, the overall cost of the epidemic in 2020 was \$3.5 billion. In 2020, an average of more than four people died of an opioid drug overdose every day in Virginia. The calculator also shows that, in 2020, the epidemic cost the City of Richmond \$216 million in total — or an estimated \$954 per person.

WAVY: Youngkin says drug dealers should face murder charges for overdose deaths

Drug dealers could be charged with murder in fatal overdose cases if Governor Glenn Youngkin gets his way, but critics have concerns about criminalizing those dealing with substance abuse disorders. Youngkin is calling on state lawmakers to revive a bill that was vetoed by Governor Ralph Northam in 2019. At an event earlier this month, Youngkin pledged to sign it into law if it lands on his desk during the 2023 session.

Roanoke Times: Jackson's Roanoke council campaign faces fine

Roanoke's director of elections is fining the campaign of city council candidate Jamaal Jackson \$3,100 over finance reporting issues. Andrew Cochran said the Jackson campaign submitted four of five periodic reports due so far after the deadline and that one of them was nearly two months late. Given the relevant fine policy in Virginia law, which assesses a \$100 for the first late report and \$1,000 for each successive late report, Jackson's campaign owes \$3,100, according to a letter dated Tuesday.

Youngkin and his team released details about the Ceasefire Initiative and Operation Bold Blue Line. Both will assist with making communities safer throughout the Commonwealth of Virginia" ... Pinksaw was pleased with what he heard from Virginia's leaders at the roundtable. He believes Operation Bold Blue Line and the Ceasefire Initiative will help law enforcement. "We are blessed to have Glenn Youngkin, Winsome Sears, Jason Miyares and Bob Mosier leading the way in the Commonwealth of Virginia," Pinksaw said. "Thank you all, for your commitment to law enforcement and public safety in the Commonwealth of Virginia. It is truly a breath of fresh air!"

More help for Emporia is on the way as part of Miyares' Operation Ceasefire initiative. It was unveiled Monday along with Operation Bold Blue Line. Emporia is one of 12 cities partnering in the Operation Ceasefire initiative to address violent criminal activity among repeat offenders. According to an OAG press release, Operation Ceasefire will reduce violent crime by investing in gang prevention. Other aspects of the initiative include supporting victim protection funding, community policing in high-crime neighborhoods, and getting the most violent and repeat offenders off the streets. The other cities in the Operation Ceasefire partnership are Chesapeake, Danville, Hampton, Lynchburg, Martinsville, Newport News, Norfolk, Petersburg, Portsmouth, Richmond, and Roanoke. The General Assembly approved \$5 million for Operation Ceasefire. Miyares expects the initiative to get fully funded by the winter.

The Free Lance-Star: Editorial – Beware politicians peddling integrity

Attorney General Jason Miyares recently took to the pages of the Washington Post to defend the creation of his Election Integrity Unit...No doubt, the stories that Miyares heard from his parents while growing up gave him an appreciation for our nation's "rights and liberties." But to suggest that there are many in the United States who don't understand or appreciate these liberties because they "have never experienced" anything but liberty is to fundamentally misunderstand America's past and present. Black Americans have their own history to tell. And the stories that their families pass down include lynchings, redlining, and the horrors of "separate but equal." All of these events have happened within our nation's past 100 years. And lest we believe things are better, Black people in Virginia and across the nation are still victimized by overt and covert racism. Blacks are disproportionately pulled over and searched by police officers in Virginia, according to...the Community Policing Act Data Collection. Black people are also far more likely to spend time in jail than white people, according to research from the Vera Institute of Justice.

Those in America's LGBTQ+ community also have stories to tell. The fight for marriage equality, after all, was only settled in 2015. And Gov. Glenn Youngkin's recently launched assault on transgender students suggests that for the next few years anyway, yet another marginalized group will face overt discrimination. America's women have stories to tell, too. Only since the 1970s have women had the opportunity to compete on an even playing field in interscholastic athletics, medical schools, law schools, and dental schools...Miyares, if he has learned anything from his experience in this country, should know that liberty is not equally distributed.

Rather than lecturing Virginians on liberty, Miyares would do better to reexamine his motivation for establishing the Election Integrity Unit. After all, he admits openly what far too few Republicans—including all eight Republicans running for the U.S Congress in Virginia—will admit. There was no election fraud in 2020, and there is no evidence such fraud ever occurred in Virginia...Bravo to Miyares for saying this. But if there is no fraud, then why the Election Integrity Unit? According to Miyares, it's because "[t]here is no reason any Virginian should have any doubt walking into a voting

Royal Examiner: <u>Gun safety, gun rights advocates disagree on effectiveness of new merchant</u> code

Gun rights advocates fear a new merchant code for firearm purchases is an unnecessary attack on their civil liberties, while gun safety advocates say the code just levels the playing field. The International Standards Organization approved a petition from New York-based Amalgamated Bank last month for a new merchant code. According to its website, the ISO is a Geneva-based nonprofit with global members who establish best practices across a range of subjects...The new code allows for the separate categorization of firearm purchases...Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares joined 23 other attorneys general from across the country in a letter against the new merchant category. Miyares is against collecting and tracking private data by "big government and big businesses," his office stated in an email comment. "This new policy will do little more than put Virginians' privacy at risk," Miyares stated, "and discourage law-abiding citizens from exercising their constitutional right to purchase a firearm." The purchase of firearms should be "no one's business but their own," Miyares stated. "To reduce gun violence, we need to get violent, repeat offenders off our streets instead of tracking lawful purchases at Bass Pro Shop," Miyares stated.

More than half a dozen high schools across Hampton Roads received bomb threats Monday, including four in Chesapeake. Deep Creek High School in Chesapeake received a bomb threat at 8:10 a.m., according to police. The building was evacuated and students were sent home for the day. Police, fire marshals and the Virginia State Police explosives detection K9s searched the building and grounds. Police say no explosives were found in or around the school.

Virginia Lawyers Weekly: No public right to access civil court records online

The public does not have a First Amendment right to remotely access civil court records, even though attorneys can access the records and they are publicly available at the courthouse, the Eastern District of Virginia has ruled in a case of first impression. The plaintiff challenged two state statutes: one which denies attorneys not admitted in Virginia from accessing court records online, and another which prevents the dissemination of records obtained online to third parties.

13 News Now: Virginia continues to receive payments for opioid epidemic settlements. Across the seven cities, Portsmouth had the highest death rate from opioid use in 2020...Here in the commonwealth, the first payment of \$67.4 million was received on Wednesday. This includes \$11.3 million for the state, \$16.3 million for Virginia localities and \$39.8 million for the Opioid Abatement Authority. According to Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares, the settlement also prevents Johnson & Johnson from selling opioids, lobbying for legislation that would benefit their company and promoting any third-parties. So far, Virginia has received payments from the other responsible parties as well. This means that the state has received more than \$100 million, and more is expected to come. "I'm thrilled that the money from these record-breaking settlements is on its way. My consumer protection section worked tirelessly to ensure that Virginians received the most funding possible and received it as quickly as possible," Miyares said in a statement. "This helps the Commonwealth and individual localities fight back against the opioid epidemic and reduce, prevent, and treat addiction."

WDBJ: Virginia invests \$5M to fight violent crimes in cities like Roanoke

Operation Ceasefire is an initiative from Attorney General Jason Miyares to combat violent crimes across Virginia. Roanoke is one of the cities taking part, and as many of you know is no stranger to shootings. Roanoke City Police Chief Samuel Roman is appreciative of the new funding and says it will help law enforcement be more successful. According to the AG, 5 million dollars were allocated for Ceasefire in the budget this year. The money will be invested in three different areas. One of those is hiring up to 6 violent crime prosecutors.

"With a specific emphasis on conspiracy cases, enterprise cases, and RICO cases. It would be great to have a prosecutor who can dedicate most of their time to these very long-term intricate but very impactful and powerful investigations," said Chief Roman. RICO cases are generally used to combat organized crime, with multiple people arrested at once for conspiring together. Chief Roman says most of the violence in Roanoke City is perpetuated by a small group of people. "And the message here is if you continue to do wrong or if you continue to involve yourself in criminal activity specific emphasis on violent criminal activity. We're coming after you," added Chief Roman. "We're coming after you with everything we have." Funds will also help start a program to protect victims and witnesses. "It's tough for them to come testify, be re-traumatized by what they endured, or either witness," explained Chief Roman. "So, any support monetarily that can be diverted into physical attributes of support for victims and witnesses. We're all for that."

The last strategy for the Office of the Attorney General is hiring 2 to 3 Group Violence Intervention Coordinators. Adding to some of the programs the department already has.

"Making sure that we are interjecting ourselves as role models, mentors for the young people as well," said Chief Roman. "Our prevention work is as important as our prosecution work as well." The ultimate measure of success for the operation is reducing gun violence in the city. But Chief Roman says it will take time. "A truly measure approach would be to look at it the long term and see if all of the things that we have put in place has led to the reduction in crime," said Chief Roman.

WJLA: <u>Umstattd concerned about how Biberaj allegedly treats domestic abuse victims</u> In Loudoun County, Democratic Commonwealth's Attorney Buta Biberaj is losing support from some members of her own party. 7News WJLA-TV was the first to report Loudoun County Supervisor Kristen Umstattd's remarks at a Board of Supervisors meeting this week. At Tuesday's Loudoun County Board of Supervisors meeting, Umstattd (D) criticized how Biberaj handled a recent high-profile case that involved releasing an accused killer from jail. "I have to fact-check everything she says," Loudoun County Supervisor Kristen Umstattd told 7News WJLA-TV. "Before we start talking about fact-checking, please bring the evidence to the table," Biberaj told 7News. In a 7News interview, Umstattd, who represents Leesburg on the Loudoun County Board of Supervisors, raised several concerns about her fellow Democrat. Those concerns are now being shared publicly for the first time.

"Members of the board, myself included, have had concerns since January of 2021 about a year into Ms. Biberaj's term in office," Umstattd told 7News Reporter Nick Minock. "We have a domestic abuse response team in Loudoun County that includes members of the sheriff's office, nonprofits who work with victims of domestic abuse, and the Commonwealth's Attorney's office, as well as judges. Concerns were raised by a number of members of that response team that the Commonwealth's Attorney was not fully prosecuting domestic abuse cases and was not protecting the victims and did not seem to understand her obligation to protect the victims." Umstattd told 7News that the Board of Supervisors raised these concerns to Biberaj last year. "We raised these issues with her during our budget session in 2021," Umstattd told 7News. "After that, things did not get better. She [Biberaj] continued, she let go a man who had attempted to murder his wife. She let him go and he went back and he did murder his wife. She did not hold in custody a young man who raped a girl in one of our high schools. She released him he went back and sexually assaulted another girl in another high school." "There was a case with a serial burglar where she [Biberaj] was pulled off the case for lack of professionalism, and the judge stated he felt he could not trust her," said Umstattd. "There was another case involving another sexual assault in which she was pulled off the case by another judge who made similar statements about lack of professionalism in the Commonwealth Attorney's Office and lack of integrity." "So it's been one thing after another straight for almost three years now," said Umstattd. "It's not getting better. We've had two discussions as a board with her about our concerns. We had hoped she would take those seriously. She [Biberaj] has paid lip service to victim protection but if you talk to her privately, what she says about victims is they can be very untrustworthy and she needs to get them back - she needs to get the abuser back into the home so the victim doesn't lose any family income. That is considered the worst possible approach to victim protection by people who work with victims all the time." "So I have just found over the years that I have to fact-check everything she says and most of the time if she is being defensive, she is not telling the full truth, and that has just played out time and time again," said Umstattd. In an on camera interview, 7News Reporter Nick Minock presented Biberaj what Umstattd said before airing and publishing this story. "I will try to hit the 75 points that you [Umstattd] put out in that one statement," Biberaj said during a 7News interview. "So let's talk about a couple of things. For starters, anyone who has ever been involved in the criminal justice system understands that it is a complex process. For starters, let's talk about how the process starts. And that is done with an investigation by law enforcement. As prosecutors, we are limited by the evidence that we have as to what we can be able to show in court. We have no control over that." "The comments indicated that the board has on two occasions raised it to our attention that there is something that they wish to see differently," said Biberaj. "I will suggest this: I think in the course of a year, there's 365 days. We've

been in office for almost 1,000 days. For there to be two conversations with us is a missed opportunity for community leaders to make this a genuine issue. So I invite them, pick up the phone. Come, join me for lunch, I'll even pay for it. I'll be glad to have a conversation where you think that I am missing an opportunity to better serve our community." "I will stand on this: the quote by Ms. Umstattd indicating that I have ever made that statement about our victims is an outright lie," said Biberaj. "So, we want to call a spade a spade - we will do that. I have never had that as my statement because of this reason: under my leadership in this office, all we have done is focus on the rights of victims. You know why? Because they are the soul of our community. We are here for that very purpose."

"In domestic violence cases, it is a nationwide, a countrywide, it is a statewide problem as well as a Loudoun County-wide problem that less than 80% of those cases result in a conviction," said Biberaj. "And you know why? That's because the system is not set up to support victims in a way that we want to do that. That's what we've been trying to do is to focus on the front end, what services we can provide to the victims so that if they aren't able to use our system, that they can contribute more fully to the prosecution." "We received a grant in 2020 for that very sole purpose, so we could educate that community," said Biberaj. "So if anyone were to suggest to you that I am not victim-centric or I don't support our victim, I would suggest what you do is you come and you spend time with our office. We literally spent days, hours, weeks working with our victims. We have seven victim witness case managers, that was increased from four." "When I came to this office, our attorneys are up to six when it used to be two and that is the resources that I have invested in this very issue because on day one, that was my commitment to this community," said Biberaj. "We were not going to treat victims as a process. We're going to treat them as human beings."

"So I reject everything that she has indicated as to how we have not succeeded in this community." said Biberaj. "Because I will tell you this. I don't know anybody in that office, who has sat down with a victim and worked with them like my team has. I don't know anybody in that office who has sat down with a victim and cried with them when something has happened in court, that they did not expect to happen even if the person went to jail or didn't go to jail, because it tears lives up, and we are here with them." "So I welcome any member of the board of supervisors or any member of our community, who stands and wishes to suggest that we are not serving the best interests of our community," said Biberaj. "Please come by. Do not listen to these bits of rhetoric or these one liners. And these are all conclusory statements." "So we start talking about fact-checking, please bring the evidence to the table. We're all lawyers," said Biberaj. "Come to the table. Bring me your evidence. Otherwise, what it is, it's an unfortunate statement based on misinformation. Or maybe just intentional misinformation, I don't know but I welcome the opportunity to have that conversation. I'm going to continue to do the best doggone job I can for Loudoun County. You know what, I chose to take this job to do the job and I'll continue to serve our people because you know what: the people understand what we're doing." Biberaj has also defended herself from criticism from Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares. On Friday, Biberai pointed to data she said was reported to the Virginia Attorney General's office on domestic and sexual violence in Virginia: 2021 Virginia Attorney General Domestic and Sexual Violence in Virginia 2021 Annual Report 1.

WSET: AG Miyares joins 19 state coalition launching investigations into 6 major banks. Attorney General Jason Miyares announced Wednesday that members of a multistate coalition including 19 attorneys general have served six major American banks with civil investigative demands, which act as a subpoena, asking for documents relating to the companies' involvement with the United Nations' (UN) Net-Zero Banking Alliance (NZBA). The banks under investigation include Bank of America, Citigroup, Goldman Sachs, JP Morgan Chase, Morgan Stanley, and Wells Fargo. NZBA-member banks must set emissions reduction targets in their lending and investment portfolios to reach net zero by 2050. Missouri is leading the investigation, with Arizona, Kentucky, and Texas also serving as leadership states on this investigation. "The U.N's Net-Zero Banking Alliance, which includes American companies, punishes Virginia farmers and Virginia companies that deal with

fossil fuel-related activities. Virginians are not subject to UN business standards. That's why I've joined a coalition of attorney generals investigating six major American banks for ceding authority to a foreign body," said Miyares. In addition to Virginia, Arizona, Arkansas, Indiana, Kansas, Kentucky, Louisiana, Mississippi, Montana, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Texas have joined the Missouri-led investigation into the six banks. Five other states have joined but can't be named due to state laws or regulations regarding confidentiality.

Virginia Mercury: <u>Potential class-action suit seeks overtime pay for Virginia General Assembly aides</u>

A former aide to Virginia Del. Marie March, R-Floyd, has filed a civil lawsuit against her onetime boss, claiming March asked her to do private work in a taxpayer-funded job and raising the prospect of class-action litigation on overtime pay for hundreds of legislative staffers. Tambra Lynn Blankenship, a Giles County resident who briefly worked for March over the summer, filed the suit last week in Richmond City Circuit Court. She's seeking a judgment of at least \$70,000 and court approval to initiate a class action that could involve 500 to 1,000 legislative aides whom Blankenship's lawyers argue may have been improperly denied overtime pay by the General Assembly. "State law requires that [legislative aides] be provided compensation for every hour worked," the complaint says. A woman who answered the phone at March's district office Thursday said the delegate had decided not to comment...The House of Delegates clerk's office, which handles some of the body's administrative functions but leaves individual delegates largely free to run their own offices, said it was looking into the matter and could not immediately comment. The office of Attorney General Jason Miyares also said it was looking into the issue. Neither the state nor March have filed a formal response in court.

Virginia Mercury: <u>Virginia joins multistate investigation into major banks' net-zero</u> commitments

Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares is joining 18 other states in an investigation of six major American banks over their environmental, social and governance, or ESG, investing, citing harms to Virginia farmers and companies...In a news release from Miyares' office Wednesday, the first-term Republican attorney general said Virginia joined 18 other states in serving six major American banks with a civil investigative demand, which acts as a subpoena, for the institutions to produce documents related to their involvement with the United Nations Net-Zero Banking Alliance...Miyares in his release said the alliance includes American companies and punishes Virginia farmers and Virginia companies that deal with fossil fuel-related activities...The pushback against ESG investments has been spurred by Republican-led states including Florida, where Gov. Ron DeSantis has cast himself

as fighting the imposition of a "woke" mentality on businesses, and Texas, which has passed legislation requiring state pension funds to divest from companies that "boycott" energy companies. Lawyers told CNBC earlier this month that the independence of the banks likely protects them from charges of violating antitrust law, unless a coordinated effort among the members can be demonstrated...This August, Miyares announced Virginia would also join a Missouri-led investigation into ESG investing ratings companies Morningstar, Inc. and Sustainalytics for alleged violations of state consumer protection laws. In a release by the Office of the Attorney General, Miyares said there had been "credible allegations" that the companies "allow(ed) anti-Israel bias to infect the ESG ratings they provided to investors."

Prince William Times: <u>Indicted former Prince William County election chief launches fundraising effort to pay her legal fees</u>

Former Prince William County elections chief Michele White is scheduled to appear in court again Friday morning on criminal charges related to her duties during the 2020 presidential election. But this time, White says, she'll have an attorney to defend her against what she now suspects are politically charged allegations against her. White was indicted by a grand jury Sept. 7 on charges of corruption, lying on a state form and neglect of duty in connection with her official duties. White, 51, of Occoquan, launched a GoFundMe account earlier this week to raise money for attorney fees, which she says she cannot afford to pay alone. As of Thursday morning, the fund had raised \$1,880 toward its \$40,000 goal...White last appeared in court on Sept. 23. During that hearing, she told Judge Carroll Weimer Jr. that she had not yet hired an attorney and asked to extend her trial to December or January. Weimer declined to extend the case that long and set another court date for Friday, Oct. 21. After the hearing, Virginia Assistant Attorney General Josh Lief, who is prosecuting the case for the commonwealth, declined to comment on the allegations behind White's indictment.

Richmond Free Press: Operation Bold Blue Line

What's the solution to the spate of shootings and violence that appears to be on the upswing in Richmond and across the state? Gov. Glenn A. Youngkin believes beefing up currently beleaguered and undermanned law enforcement agencies and investing in witness protection and local crime prevention initiatives is the best way to go. On Monday, the governor came to Norfolk to roll out Operation Bold Blue Line as he dubbed his action plan to address the apparent surge in violence that has increased local cries for help and support. His plan would mostly pour funding into police pay. recruiting and equipment in a bid to attract more people to carry a badge, though much of his proposal will need to wait for funding approval... His plan, though, does not include support for commonwealth's attorneys, the lawyers who prosecute crime, so they can fill their vacancies. That's the reason Norfolk Commonwealth's Attorney Ramin Fatehi participated in another event and was among many prosecutors who stayed away. He said he watched the press conference but felt the plan did little to address the problems prosecutors are facing, a shortage of staff. "If the governor and attorney general wanted to help local prosecutors, they would support the full funding of local prosecutor's offices," he said. Mr. Fatehi was disappointed that instead, the governor blamed him and others for contributing to the current conditions through what the governor described as a failure to prosecute to "keep violent offenders behind bars." Such statements do nothing to address crime, Mr. Fatehi said, but instead just "widen the gap between the prosecutors who are doing this job every day and a non-lawyer like Glenn Youngkin or a man who spent two years mostly prosecuting misdemeanors like Jason Miyares."

Royal Examiner: <u>Attorney General Miyares joins bipartisan coalition to regulate abusive practices of pharmacy benefit managers</u>

On October 18, 2022, Attorney General Jason Miyares joined a bipartisan coalition of 34 attorneys general from across the country in an amicus brief in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit supporting Oklahoma's laws regulating pharmacy benefit managers' abusive behavior (PBMs).

Oklahoma's laws regulating PBMs are similar to Virginia's and are being challenged in the latest of a string of lawsuits by the PBM industry's national lobbying association, the Pharmaceutical Care Management Association (PCMA). Attorney General Miyares and the bipartisan coalition seek to protect Virginia consumers by assuring that Virginia and all states can regulate PBMs.

Vega: "You know, it's about reminding folks what's at stake, if they are happy about what's happened over the last two years, then perhaps I'm not their candidate. But based on the conversations that we are having tonight and just up and down the 7th district people want change. People are tired of my opponent's double standard, her lip service, and when we win on the 8th of November we are going to bring the change that we both desperately need and want."

Reporter: "Right now, UVA's Center for Politics says this race leans democrat, but republicans have been putting a lot of energy into winning the seat. Election Day is November 8th. You can cast an early ballot until november 15th. Live in the studio, Garrett Whitton, FOX Virginia News."

5:34:21pm: "Keeping an eye on the Commonwealth now, Virginia Attorney General Jason Miyares taking to the Washington Post to defend his decision to create an Election Integrity Unit, which he says aims to quote 'ensure legality and purity in election.' The unit's existence, announced back in September, has been criticized by media who say that it investigates a quote "fantasy offense" of widespread election fraud that conspiracists began to push after the 2020 election – an election that Miyares himself says was fair. Miyares argues the election integrity unit was not at all inspired by the

2020 election. In his op-ed, he says quote 'the goal is to more efficiently work with the election community by creating a more cooperative and collaborative approach from our office', and adds that the unit is a restructuring of lawyers and investigators already employed by the office and working on election matters. He claims no new tax dollars are used and no employee is taken away from other responsibilities. Back in September the Virginia NAACP called on Miyares to disband the unit and replace it with a task force focused on reducing voter suppression and intimidation, and increasing voter participation."

WVTF: To battle misinformation, more elections offices are hiring PR pros

In less than a month voters head to the polls for the Congressional midterms and municipal elections. Talk to local officials running those elections and they'll tell you their job has become busier in the past few years — complicated by the fight against misinformation. Now local registrars are turning to communication pros to help wage that battle. A few weeks ago, notices went out to voters in Richmond who had been drawn into new districts. But some of those notices had a mistake. Keith Balmer, Richmond's general registrar, notified the state department of elections, got the information fixed, and let the impacted voters know. But then, there was the backlash. . . . This is exactly why Balmer recently hired a full-time communication specialist, Katherin Cardozo-Robledo.

Culpeper Times: <u>Culpeper chief violates personnel policy with Spanberger endorsement</u> Culpeper Town Police Chief Chris Jenkins seemingly violated the town's personnel policy manual by appearing in uniform on town property in a new television political advertisement, endorsing Congresswoman Abigail Spanberger for reelection. The ad, called "Shocked," shows Jenkins, a Republican, endorsing Spanberger for reelection in Virginia's 7th District in his chief uniform at the Culpeper Town Police Station.

WTOP: Gov. Youngkin on new transgender policies: 'It's the law'

The public has only a few days left to comment on Virginia Gov. Glenn Youngkin's proposed policy changes for transgender students in schools, and Youngkin is making it clear that he expects school systems to follow the changes once they are finalized. "It's the law," Youngkin said in an interview with WTOP. "We can't be in a moment where people can just pick the laws they want to abide by and the ones they don't."

The DCist: Early voter turnout in Virginia is 'relatively strong' so far

With less than three weeks until Election Day, early voter turnout in Virginia for the November midterms appears to be on pace to surpass the last midterm election in 2018, itself a comparatively high turnout year. Early turnout is lagging a bit behind last year's highly competitive gubernatorial race, though returned mail-in ballots are tracking similarly to 2021, per the Virginia Public Access Project. . . . This is the first midterm election in Virginia since a historic expansion of early voting access in 2020, which gave voters the opportunity to cast a ballot early without an excuse and also opened up 45 days of early voting.

WTOP: <u>Voters in Northern Virginia towns receive notices with incorrect voting locations</u>
Voters in several towns in Northern Virginia got notices that had incorrect voting location information. The towns are Clifton, Dumfries, Herndon, Occoquan, Quantico and Vienna. "Following the redistricting process, the Department of Elections mailed over 6 million voter notices to all registered voters in the Commonwealth. A second mailing of 176,000 notices was sent to voters whose original notice did not include their town district number or who had a P.O. Box," the Virginia Department of Elections said in a statement, pinning the error to a "printing issue."
