



For UIA, we have recommendations the exec office is considering on expanding benefits. The ideal situation is that the President declaring a disaster and extending coverage for unemployed individuals via Disaster Unemployment Assistance (a FEMA program). This support is federally funded but administered through the state's UI program, based on state UI duration and benefits.

### State actions to extend UI include:

- Employed / sick population: Currently not covered due to "able and available" requirement. We can waive / modify this requirement on temporary basis via executive action and encourage employers to lay off employees so that they receive benefits (employers non charge). Preference would be to cover via Paid Medical Leave. We should discuss public funding option as direct employer tax would exacerbate situation.
- Employed / imposed quarantined or immunocompromised: Currently not covered. We can create emergency rule to cover with medical proof – hesitant to require doctors' note to not flood healthcare system with healthy people, but also hesitant to not require any medical qualifier as this could cause large boom in unemployed, exhaust our resources, and exacerbate unemployment impact. Robert, we will need to work with your team on solution here.
- Employed / self quarantine: Currently not covered. Best option may be encourage employers to lay off 'distancing' employees rather than put full burden on UI system. We can incentivize employers to work with us by 'non-charging' them for layoffs (normally formula is punitive to encourage employers to offer stable employment, this is an extenuating circumstance)
- Employed / employer defying public health directive: Currently not covered. Can issue emergency rule to cover by default and clarify 'employer-terminated status'
- 1099 / Transportation network company like Uber: Not covered. Could (temporarily) suspend exemption for these companies to cover employees with UI
- 1099 / General: Not covered. Could (temporarily) suspend IRS 20 factor test for independent contractor status and replace with simpler test (likely with income test to target resources)
- Others to expand access:
  - Suspend in person work search and registration requirements
  - o Suspend negative reserve balance exclusion for WorkShare (alternative to layoffs that subsidizes employment through UI Trust Fund)


#### Workers' Comp

- Urgent low hanging fruit is to clarify workplace injury definition to cover first responders (administrative)
- Can also waive initial waiting period to secure access to benefits immediately (administrative)
- Could create public presumed coverage fund (legislative). This would be expensive. Likely a better path to cover sick / quarantined via UI or PML

Kyle, we can have our team connect with yours to work on costing. They have quick and dirty estimates for some different options to get started. I can tell you right away: They are considerably more expensive incrementally than \$75M state / federal could cover. We need to draw as much as we can on existing sources (UI Trust Fund) if we hope to avoid directly billing employers, which could exacerbate the situation





# Initial Claims - Weekly - Current



This week (Sunday – Wednesday) our initial claims number is 56,328.

The following is from today's dashboard which shows activity since last Friday, comparing expected initial claims during this time compared to the actual.

The following chart shows a historical perspective of initial claims activity during the Great Recession.







This 9-month period had an average of 32,500 initial claims per week with a peak week of nearly 77,000. Unemployment rate reached 15% in June 2009. Something to just note here and probably not to include is that a 15% unemployment rate was realized with this consistent claim activity, but also the number of weekly continued claims where benefits were paid. In what we are experiencing today, current belief is there will be a permanent loss of some jobs, but many that are currently laid-off should return to work soon after the pandemic subsides. Plenty of economist thoughts that are all across the board on this, which means in reality, nobody really knows for sure and little consensus.

### Remaining graphics are also in the PPT I sent today.


I'd show our spike in call wait times as shown below and note that peak periods occur during the morning hours. Can note that today (3/19) there was only a 5:34 average wait time to file a claim as currently, the majority of our calls our people inquiring into their eligibility (will highlight comments later on this).




Next is our claim filing total contacts wherein we have seen a spike this entire week, but clear our messaging has been effective in driving people to file online instead of calling.



Next is our claim inquiry figures. Can also note that our average handle time has gone from around 8 minutes to nearly 13 minutes given the questions individuals have regarding their eligibility. The most common questions are simply: (1) Am I eligible for benefits (2) I'm on a current claim or had a claim within the last year, am I eligible for the six additional weeks and (3) My claim I just filed was denied since I didn't have enough wages.



This is our total contacts, with the caveat that our spike in call wait-times for individuals saw in increase use in the chat function which we count in these figures.
